REPORT ON THE EDUCATIONAL TRIP TO AKOSOMBO

On the 11th of April, 2016, the Sixth form students of the school embarked on an educational trip to Akosombo in the Eastern region of Ghana. The trip was intended to give the students an insight into hydroelectric power generation, as a supplement to their mainstream learning. A total of 38 students (17 girls and 211 boys) and two Masters (Mr. Appiah-Krofa Samuel and Mr. Agamasu Hubert) embarked on the two-day journey to Akosombo. For safety reasons, an indirect route was taken through Accra to the destination.

The group set off at 4am and arrived in Accra at 10:30am. Breakfast was arranged at southern fried chicken after which the journey continued. We reached Akosombo at about 2:30 and were received by attendants of VRA. After the usual formalities, we were taken on a tour around the power station. An experienced tour guide, by name Ms. Nice, engaged the students in an interesting lecture about power generation. The first point of tour was the dam itself where students were alarmed to see how low the water level has fallen. The students were enjoined to cultivate the attitude of power conservation at school and at home.

The students noted down several facts about the hydroelectric station and also asked questions. As a security zone, no pictures were to be taken. But owing to the comportment of the students, the tour guide allowed them to take a few. After wards the group retired to the cozy VRA guest house where we washed down in preparation for supper.

The following day we set of at five, taking a short tour of VRA International School. We got to Accra at 11 and had breakfast, and later we headed for Kumasi. After lunch at a rest stop, we finally arrives on Campus at 5:00pm. Throughout the journey the masters kept count of students at every stop and ensured that students fastened their seatbelts at all times.

The trip was very successful and has ignited a passion for power production among some students. Currently, there is a suggestion for the construction of a simple hydroelectric system to convert waste bath water from the dormitories into electricity. The students have also been convinced on the need to manage power wisely. We would like to express gratitude to God, The management of ICS, VRA, Mr. Patrick Herbert, Manager of VRA Guest house and all who made this trip a memorable one.

A few students helped with mixing mortar, transporting sand and cement from one place to another and laying the blocks to form walls.

The chief of the place was present at the site. He was more than overwhelmed by the numbers and enthusiasm the students showed in the work. He was glad the students honoured their promise to show up and support him in this good work. He was once spotted helping the workers mix mortar – such humility.

At the end of the day's work, the chief expressed his uttermost gratitude to the students and facilitators for everything that day. He mentioned that for the school he is building to be the school it is supposed to be, it partly depends on the students and the school. He urged the students and school to, out of their heart, help as much as they can to materialize this great plan. The students and the facilitators bid the people farewell and came back to the school.
